A SHORT HISTORY OF DOGHAM FARM

The first owner, **Joseph Royall**, b. 1600 in London, left England on the "Charitie" and arrived in Jamestown in July 1622.

In about 1645 Joseph Royall married **Katherine Banks**, whose father was from Canterbury, England. Joseph Royall received 300 acres of land at Charles City in 1637 which, eventually, grew into 1,100 acres. Historically the name has been as d'Augham, Doggam, Doggams and Dogham, but is today **Dogham Farm**. According to Royall tradition the name is associated with the family's pre-Conquest origins in Normandy, France. Genealogists and linguists speculate that **Pays d'Auge** (the Auge Country) is likely to be the Norman region in question, owing to the d'Aug... in the original name as above.

Sometime after the death of Joseph Royall in 1654 Katherine married Capt. Henry Isham of Bermuda Hundred.

The property remained in the Royall family until 1929 when distant cousins, the Harrisons, who were both Isham descendants, purchased it and now their granchildren, the Mitchells, are the current owners.

Because of the marraiges of Ketherine Banks to Joseph Royall and Henry Isham, Dogham Farm has been owned continuously by her descendants making the Mitchell family the 12th and 13th generations to call it their home.

"The families that acquired and resided at Dogham Farm, including Joseph Royall, his wife Katherine Banks and her second husband Henry Isham, helped to transform Virginia from a collection of straggling settlements into a prosperous colony.

"The Royalls and the Ishams, along with other families, also assumed social and governmental roles in the 1650's and so foreshadowed the establishment of a Virginian 'tidewater aristocracy'".

The lands of Dogham Farm extend between the VA State 5 Highway and the banks of the James River.
